Surgery, where they viewed a video of a kidney transplant, spoke to a transplant team, and examined surgical instruments first-hand. This visit furthered the education received during their November visit to the Sharing Network, the largest organ procurement organization in New Jersey. There the students learned about the importance of organ donation and were honored to meet a heart and liver transplant recipient. They were deeply moved by the presentation and look forward to spreading the word about how ordinary people can be heroes by making the decision to become organ donors.


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PHS STUDENT ATHLETES COMMIT ON SIGNING DAY

QUI BBLETOWN AUXI LI ARY GYM OFFERS STRENGTH AND ENDURANCE TRAINING FOR ALL STUDENTS

The Quibbletown auxiliary gym is has become a highlight of the PE cycle for all Quibbletown students. All students take classes in the auxiliary gym for

two weeks in every six week period. The goal is to increase each student's muscular strength, muscular endurance, and flexibility. Students began with simple strength training equipment (balance balls, bosu balls, aerobic bars, strength bands) and graduated to more advanced items (plyometric boxes & kettlebells). In the last few years, students began working with pull-up and dip bars and TRX suspension straps. The position of the room also allows for easy access to the outdoor fitness trail.
