NJDOE AWARDS PISCATAWAY \$1.8 MILLION FOR FULL DAY PRESCHOOL PROGRAM

The New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) awarded Piscataway Schools a \$1.8 million grant for its preschool program for the 2018-2019 school year. The Preschool Education Expansion Aid (PEEA) grant is offered through the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) Division of Early Childhood and Family Engagement. Its goal is to increase access to high-quality full day preschool for three- and four-year-old children in the 2018-19 school year.



With the PEEA grant award, the Piscataway School District can extend its tuition-free full day preschool program to three-year-olds as well as four-year-olds, with preference given to families who meet income eligibility guidelines, and expand teaching and supervisory staff. The District's Preschool Program, housed at Children's Corner, will add a second fulltime supervisor. Other staff additions include a certified behaviorist, a master teacher, an ESL support teacher, and a family liaison. Salary supplements for teachers and aides directly involved with the program are also included in the grant.

The PEEA Grant is awarded annually, and the grant for the 2018-2019 school year begins on October 1, 2018. Specific information regarding applications and enrollment will be mailed to parents currently enrolled at Children's Corner, and the District will publicize this opportunity and reach out to other township parents interested in exploring preschool through Piscataway Schools.

DISTRICT WELCOMES INPUT FOR STRATEGIC PLANNING

The District invites parents, neighbors, teachers, and administrators to work together to create a shared vision for Piscataway Schools. Together, we will develop goals and objectives for a comprehensive strategic plan to move the District forward to meet the challenges of the 21st Century. An introductory meeting will take place on Monday, October 15, 2018, at 7pm in Room F100 at Piscataway High School. This meeting will be facilitated by representatives of the New Jersey School Boards Association, who will explain the strategic planning process, and how stakeholders can best contribute their thoughts, plans, and hopes for the future. Strategic Planning answers three questions:

- 1. Where are we today?
- 2. Where do we want to be in the future?
- 3. What should we focus on today, to make it more likely we will meet our future goals?

An introductory meeting will take place on Monday, October 15, at 7 pm in Room F100 at PHS. Planning meetings will take place on Monday, October 29, Tuesday, November 27, and Monday, January 14, all at 7pm in the PHS Commons.

JERSEY CARES VOLUNTEERS AT CONACKAMACK

Jersey Cares continues to partner with Piscataway Schools, hosting corporate volunteer days designed to give back to local communities. In

August, Conackamack school hosted Jersey Cares volunteers from Fragomen, who painted classrooms, built Adirondack chairs, painted flag murals, and beautified the faculty room. In September, Arbor will host Jersey Cares volunteers from Eli Lilly, who will paint murals, build flower beds, and landscape the school's entrance. JUMP AHEAD SUMMER PROGRAM MEASURES SUCCESS

Jump Ahead is Piscataway's Summer Academic Program designed to develop and strengthen students' skills for the upcoming school year. Both branches of the program, Academic Assistance and Academic Enrichment, combine digital learning with small group instruction tailored to meet varied learning competences in a structured environment. The digital platforms for instruction, Lexia in Literacy and Dreambox in Mathematics, are adaptive to the students' grade level and academic growth. This summer, the data collected over the six-week period indicates 48% growth in lesson mastery overall. Generally, Dreambox and Lexia expect 10% growth over the same time period. All students and staff are proud of their progress and happy to be part of this successful program




