#### PISCATAWAY INTRODUCES MIDDLE SCHOOL FOOTBALL

## DISTRICT COMMITMENT TO IPAD PLATFORM OFFERS EXPANDED PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The district's commitment to responsible technology using the iPad platform continues to grow, with students enrolled in grades 4-10 now using district iPads. This commitment is much greater than simply supplying a device – it includes training to accelerate instruction and learning with a focus on using creative tools and building a positive technology culture. Investing in professional development is at the core of the district's technology plan. Supervisor of Instructional



Technology Chris Irovando was recently accepted into the highly competitive Apple Learning Academy in Cupertino, California, and spent a week there learning about best practices for Apple products and software for students and schools. Mr. Irovando brought back a wealth of knowledge in macOS and iOS devices and Apple apps to ensure effective coaching for staff across all learning levels. He is now authorized as an Apple Learning Specialist and will receive additional support and access to Learning Specialist content for two years. In addition to scheduled professional development days, staff can take part in "Tech Wednesdays," when Mr. Irovando visits different schools to share his knowledge of tech platforms and develop instructional skills. Next steps in building a positive technology culture include incorporating Apple TVs in grades four and five classrooms.

#### KING STUDENTS WELCOME SENIORS FOR TEA AND TALK

Students enrolled in the Honors ELA program at King school hosted senior citizens from the community during their Tea and Talk event. In preparation for their Oral History Project, students had an opportunity to practice interviewing techniques in a relaxing and informal environment. Prior to the event, students learned how to actively listen to their interviewee and ask openended questions. Led and facilitated by the Honors ELA teacher, Karen Fleming, the event was arranged so that students could do more than simply read about history, but hear actual stories from the people who lived through them.



# ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES BUILD STEM, ART, AND SPORTS SKILLS

Students from preschool through grade five have an opportunity to explore new areas in STEM, the arts, and sports when they enroll in After School or Saturday Enrichment Classes offered through the Office of Community Education. Now almost halfway through fall eight-week courses, a big favorite is after school tennis. But students enjoy the breadth of choices the program offers, from Mad Science and Code Explorers, to Bricks and Sticks Animation and KidzArt Animals, to Cake and Cookie Decorating, to Zumba, Ballet, Bollywood Dance, and more. Special Saturday Planetarium shows are offered twice during this period, with the next showing coming up on November 2.

### SCHOOL COMMUNICATIONS EFFORTS HONORED BY NJSPRA

Piscataway Schools was recently honored with two awards from the New Jersey School Public Relations Association (NJSPRA) for communications efforts during 2018-2019. The District took first place for newsletters for the Superintendent's Report

#### CONACKAMACK STUDENT SCIENTISTS TEST VARIABLES AND RECORD DATA

Conackamack students learned about testing variables by working with Sowbugs.

Students selected factors to manipulate in a Sowbug's choice chambers environment, and then recorded what environment they preferred. Students experimented with dark vs. light; fruit vs. vegetables; fresh vs. rotten food; and food color. Students will next graph their data and present their results a CER (Claims, Evidence, Reasoning) format.





### PHS ACADEMIES EXPAND TO INCLUDE PRELAW AND JUSTICE

Following the successful launch of academy learning at PHS, the 2019-2020 school year admitted 20 students to the launch year of the Pre-law and Justice Academy. In addition to this new area of focus, PHS Academies will build programs overall this year with the inclusion of a Guest Speaker Series, welcoming college recruiters and field experts to share their knowledge and offer additional interest paths to academy students. Middle school students receive information about PHS Academies in their first marking period of eighth grade, giving them time to consider if a focused area of study is right for them, and if so, plenty of time to prepare for the application process.

#### AFJROTC TEAMS UP WITH KNOLLWOOD BUDDIES

PHS Cadets from the AFJROTC are again generously donating their time to serve as mentors for Knollwood students. This yearly tradition brings the cadets and Knollwood students together once



a week after school, to create projects, help with homework, and just talk. The cadets serve as fine examples to our young students, exhibiting respect and commitment.

### PHS DIVERSITY COUNCIL TEAM TRAINS WITH DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Student members of the PHS Diversity Council Team began the year with a training session led by Ms. Linda Ortiz, a Conciliation Specialist with the US Department of Justice. The training is in response to racially insensitive social media messages posted last year. These student leaders will now conduct workshops for the entire PHS community to promote better understanding among all diverse groups. The United States Department of Justice: Community Relations Service (CRS) division is the only federal agency dedicated to working with community groups to resolve community conflicts and prevent and respond to alleged hate crimes arising from differences of race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, or disability. Ms. Ortiz also visited the



Race and Gender in Literature course to share her expertise on conflict resolution, having difficult conversations, and building strong communities through communication.
