PHS PREPARES STUDENTS FOR 21ST CENTURY COMPUTER PATHS

Following last year's successful NJDOE Advanced Computer Science Grant, PHS launched the Java Certification, Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning class (JCAIML) in this school year. With 27 students enrolled, JCAIML offers students access to high-quality advanced computer science education using top-of-the line equipment and technology. Grant funding allowed the purchase of MacBook Pro laptops for each student, loaned to them for the school year, ensuring learning opportunities extend beyond the school day. In taking this course, students can earn credentials valued in



computer technology, including Java certification. One student, Rishi Patel, already passed his Java OCA Jr. level test with high marks. We believe PHS is the only comprehensive public high school in the country that offers Java certification as part of school curriculum. Congratulations to Supervisor of 7-12 Mathematics Jaclyn Pulio and to Computer Science Teacher Brinder Soin, for writing the grant and advancing the curriculum, and to our IT Department, for ensuring the MacBooks were loaded with all necessary software and in students' hands as quickly as possible.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AT ITS BEST

Held on Tuesday, November 5, the first student-centered professional development session for the 2019-2020 school year focusing on collaboration across the district while aligning with the District's strategic goals and vision. Facilitated by Curriculum and Instruction, each hands-on workshop integrated technology to highlight core teaching techniques. In preparing for the session, each

department head reviewed data to identify student needs and teacher growth plans, and built workshops to address those needs and plans. This was relevant professional development at its best — all hands on deck working together to build best practices in teaching and learning.



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KNOLLWOOD STUDENTS COLLABORATE ON COLORFUL ART DISPLAY

Students at Knollwood recently collaborated to create a beautiful, artistic display in the school's hallway. After learning about famous glass artist Dale Chihuly and his colorful wavy glass sculptures – called Macchia - in art class, each child created his or her own piece using coffee filters and washable markers. The project included lessons on radial symmetry, color blending and balance, and transforming shapes into rigid forms using watered down glue. To create the final display, the individual Macchia were combined to create two separate larger pieces, which were lit from within using LED lights.


