#### ARBOR TEACHER RACHEL SULLIVAN BUILDS HOME FOR SANDY VICTIM

Arbor teacher Rachel Sullivan spent her summer at the beach, but she wasn't relaxing under the sun with a good book. Instead, Ms. Sullivan was hard at work with Habitat for Humanity, helping to build a Monmouth County house to replace one destroyed by Hurricane Sandy. The homeowners, a widowed grandmother and her teenage granddaughter, had been living in a one-bedroom apartment since the storm. Habitat built the house and finished the landscaping and Ms. Sullivan also helped furnish and decorate each room in partnership with Warrick Dunn Charities "Homes for the Holidays" program for single parent families. The family moved into the home just in time for back to school!

Piscataway Township Schools opened its doors this year to over 7200 students in grades Pre-K – 12. Enrollment remains consistent. # WHITE HOUSE RECOGNIZES PISCATAWAY SCHOOLS FOR HISPANIC OUTREACH AND ACHIEVEMENT

The White House Initiative on Educational Excellence for Hispanics has named Piscataway Township Schools' Hispanic Outreach Program a "Bright Spot in Hispanic Education." Piscataway's program was one of only 230 nationwide to achieve this honor. The announcement was made by Alejandra Ceja, Executive Director of the Initiative on September 15, 2015 at the launch of Hispanic Heritage Month and in honor of the Initiative's 25th anniversary in Washington, D.C. "There has been notable progress in Hispanic educational achievement, and it is due to the efforts of these Bright Spots in Hispanic Education, programs and organizations working throughout the country to help Hispanic students reach their full potential," said Ceja. Piscataway's program, which covers students from preschool through high school and includes outreach to parents as well as students, is included in the White House Initiative on Educational Excellence for Hispanics' Bright Spots in Hispanic Education National Online Catalog. # PHS STUDENTS DISCOVER NEW DNA SEQUENCES

Twenty-six Piscataway High School students took part in a year-long research project at The *Waksman Student Scholars Program (WSSP)* at Rutgers University that yielded important results. The students focused on the DNA sequence analyses of genes isolated from a model organism. These DNA sequences had never been analyzed before and these findings could be of great interest to other scientists. The findings can be published on GenBank, the international repository of all known DNA sequences. Under the guidance of PHS teachers Dr. Craig Lollin and Ms. Lesley Wilson, the students purified and analyzed 38 DNA fragments, and 19 of these are suitable for publication on the NCBI DNA sequence database. #### PHS SENIOR BRIAN PENG NAMED NATIONAL MERIT SEMIFINALIST

PHS Senior Brian J. Peng has been named a National Merit Semifinalist in the 61st annual National Merit Scholarship program. About 1.5 million juniors in more than 22,000 high schools entered the 2016 National Merit Program by taking the 2014 PSAT, which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest scoring entrants in each state. Brian will continue in the competition for some 7,400 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$32 million that will be offered next spring. About 90 percent of the semifinalists are expected to attain finalist standing, and about half of the finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar® title.
