PHS BIOMEDICAL CAREER PATHWAYS PROGRAM WINS NJSBA SCHOOL LEADER AWARD

Piscataway High School's BioMedical Career Pathways Program is the recipient of the New Jersey School Boards Association's (NJSBA) 30th Annual School Leader Award. Piscataway is the only school district to receive this honor this year. The BioMedical Program introduces students interested in medical sciences to college-level learning, and the opportunity to -- along with high school credits -- earn up to 14 Rutgers University credits. These credits can be applied to a Rutgers degree or to a Rutgers transcript to transfer to other colleges and universities. This is just one of the many ways Piscataway collaborates with Rutgers to further student learning and opportunities. The Piscataway District and BioMedical Program will be recognized during the NJSBA's Workshop 2016 at the Atlantic City Convention Center on Wednesday, October 26, 2016. In addition, the BioMedical Program will be featured in a future issue of *School Leader* magazine.

PWAY FULLY IMPLEMENTS SCHOOLOGY FOR GRADES 4-12 IN 2016-2017

Full implementation of the Schoology Management System took place in September for grades 4 -12. Schoology uses a cloud-based platform that allows users – both teachers and students – to create, manage, and share content and resources. The platform integrates with Google Drive, Dropbox and Evernote and many other shared resources, and has a social media "feel" in usage. An example of implementation is our grade five classes' discussion of internet safety. Teachers use Netsmartz presentations to guide discussions, and following those discussions, students take an online assessment on Schoology. Next, students watch and comment on a video from the Netsmartz website and tie it back to the classroom discussions.



PISCATAWAY SCHOOLS CELEBRATE WEEK OF RESPECT

Piscataway Township Schools honored and celebrated the Week of Respect from Monday, October 3, through Friday, October 7. Students from preschool through high school, participated with special assemblies and anti-bullying programs, school spirit dress-up days and special morning announcements, character education programs and classroom instruction infused with themes of respect and kindness. Students were encouraged to share their thoughts in a variety of activities from "catching" students doing good deeds, to seeking out someone they have never spoken with before, giving compliments and thank yous, and playing anti-bullying trivia. This proactive approach to developing respect and kindness in all students fuels the *Inspire* campaign to build a positive school culture and will continue throughout the year.

CONACKAMACK STUDENTS AND SRO DISCUSS RESPECT

The week's highlight was a schoolwide Week of Respect assembly with a presentation by counselors Dr. Rogers and Ms. Manley focusing on appreciating the differences that make the Conackamack school community a special place. The assembly also featured a dynamic series of vignettes from the "I'm A Defender" Bullying Solution DVD. The vignettes spurred student discussion with the School Resource Officer, who reminded students that she is available to assist them whenever they need it. Thematically appropriate musical interludes relevant to cultures within the school played throughout the program.



RANDOLPHVILLE'S RAJVI KAMDAR VOLUNTEERS IN INDIA


During the school year, Rajvi Kamdar teaches second grade at Randolphville Elementary School, and during the summer, she travels to India as a volunteer with Uplift Humanity India. 


OUR INSPIRING HEROES
