PHS Students Earn College Credits Beyond AP

PHS students in semester one classes of Human Anatomy & Physiology I for Health Sciences, Human Anatomy & Physiology II for Health Sciences, and Dynamics in Healthcare in Society, completed their Rutgers University School of Health Professions exams in February with great results—a 96% pass rate for all students. The high majority of these students will receive college credits for their efforts. This is another important way for PHS students to take challenging courses and receive college credits beyond traditional AP courses. 


Schor Students Examine Social Justice
