#### LEAP STEAM Students Study Simple Machines



Under the guidance of Mrs.
Spasiano, second grade LEAP STEAM students explored the Engineering Unit on *Simple Machines*. Students worked in centers, built, researched, and used simple machines to

complete a task. First, they explored levers, inclined planes, wedges, pulleys, and wheel and axles. Then, they built two versions of a catapult, a working "copy machine" using Gadgets and Gizmos, and

finally, constructed their own machine. These second graders loved learning how six simple machines combine to build complex machines. Discussions included how and why simple machines are useful, jobs they can do, and how using machines makes work easier by both reducing effort and extending ability to perform tasks beyond normal capabilities.

# Seventh Grade Accelerated ELA Students Write Their Own Chapters
